Minister's Report

I remember someone once saying to me that, 'A Christian is like a tree: if they're not growing, they're dead.' A bit morbid and negative, I agree. I read in a book recently that, 'every non-conformist church (basically, all but the Catholic and Church of England) is a maximum of 70 years from closure'. If you think about the latter of these you'll probably see the point that was being made. Just as Christians need to continue to grow, so must churches.

Yes, we've had another year of Sunday worship, prayer meetings, fellowship groups and the like, but we need to look for signs of growth. People-wise through the year we lost as well as gained (as a fellowship), but I'm assuming that the Secretary's report will address this. In the baptistry we had to wait until December before we experienced growth in the size of our baptised family.

I personally began a new door-to-door initiative (though when time required doing other things I had to cut it off short), and just prior to Christmas a couple of others and myself went down town with clipboards to speak with whoever was willing from the general public about their thoughts on Christmas.

Our attendance at the Regatta was once again appreciated, and a number of positive conversations came out of that.

But I think the big 'new' thing of the year, which was a CTiD event, was our Pentecost event. If you remember, the full title was the Pentecost Parade to Pencester (PPP for short). During that day we had a good number of people who paraded, some wearing bright colours, some with flags and banners, from different starting points down to Pencester for a 3pm start time. We had two local school choirs who sang for us and a band. I think I 'top and tailed' the meeting and Josias, with the band, led us in an act of worship. The music was also clearly heard beforehand and attracted the attention of many a passer-by.

At one point during the afternoon I counted 300 people there in Pencester, and following the wrecking of our gazebos in the wind over lunch time the sun came out and it was a lovely afternoon. I can't take credit for all of it, as Josias (from the Church of England) flew in the band who came all the way from Brazil to lead our worship (and to do a couple of other things, of course).

One thing that always pleases me is the support that we/you offer to CTiD events. I recognise that the Pencester event was effectively organised by us (Carol and myself), so it's going to be more 'our' event than another church's, but within that 300 I counted 50 from here! Yes, it was a wonderful occasion, and something we can build on into the future, and we pray and trust that through such events we can 'Preach Christ crucified' in different ways to the people who don't come into our church buildings in order to worship.

Much of the same again next year? As long as 'much of the same' includes taking the name of Jesus to those don't presently know who He is.

Fellowship/Home Groups

Throughout the year the Fellowship Groups have continued to meet (usually school term-time only). We still continue to have six groups, three meeting in the evenings (Monday, Tuesday and Thursday) and three meeting on mornings (Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday). The morning ones all meet at the Church, whereas the evening ones meet in private homes.

The big change that happened towards the end of the year was the relocation of the Thursday morning group. For a number of years we had been meeting in the Church Centre (owned by the Church of England) in Aycliffe. We finally made the decision that as none of us who attended – even the Anglican keyholder lady – lived in Aycliffe, it was time to bring it home, so that meeting is now permanently located in Dover. This has actually enabled us to invite and welcome others who weren't attending in Aycliffe to come and join us and swell the numbers.

The great advantage of meeting in the Church is that there is no real danger of running out of space, so new attenders are always welcome. But, saying that, there are far less people attending Tuesday and Thursday mornings than on Wednesday.

The evening groups and one morning one (Wednesday), on the whole, follow the Questions that are produced regularly by myself. The other two morning groups and occasionally the Thursday evening group have used other material.

We still find that what we offer appeals to a small number of people from other Church denominations, which I personally find very encouraging. It may be that the other Churches don't offer such groups, but it must also mean that those who do join us from elsewhere really appreciate what we offer.

I would like to say a big 'Thank you' to all of the hosts (of the evening groups) and leaders who put their time in to prepare for each week. We all benefit from your commitment and pray that you yourselves feel encouraged in what you do.

Winter Night Shelter Report

The WNS began, for its fourth year, at the beginning of December and was due to run until the end of February 2020. Numbers of guests were slightly down on previous years with the highest number being 9 and an average of around 6/7. It was good to see again that the shelter provides much needed warmth, comfort and companionship for those who would otherwise have no roof over their heads. Through the work of the Outreach Centre, several guests were helped to move into more permanent accommodation and/or to access help they needed in other areas.

For those who don't know, there are 3 shifts: 1) Evening, when we offer a welcome, a hot meal and a chance to socialise for those who want it; 2) Night time, when usually 4 people share supervision throughout the night; 3) Morning, when we provide a breakfast and clear up after the guests have gone

A big 'thank you' to all our volunteers, most of whom barely missed a single week. At least 12 of our congregation, most of whom were members, volunteered at some stage. It is a big commitment, but necessary and rewarding, and please speak to me if you think you might be interested next year.

YOUTH MINISTRY REPORT 2019

In our Youth Ministry there are not many months that go by without an event or a special activity for the children and young people to get involved in or be part of. So let's take a look at our year.

January - 2019 started with a Prayer Sunday, and was a feature on the first Sunday of most months. These help us to explore together Christians truths, bible topics, scriptures or characters through prayer stations and develop our prayer life. There is also an opportunity for the children and YP to have individual prayer with Beryl, our Prayer Person. We continued to celebrate birthdays throughout the year with a card and chocolate!

February - Sadly due to a shortfall in staff capacity, our Little Bubbles group had to be suspended. Parents were asked to care for their own toddlers and babies during the service. We hope at some point in the future to reinstate this group, when staffing allows, to give parents time to be in the services.

March - We had great fun making fizz bath bombs and candles as gifts for Mothering Sunday. Each gift had a text attached.

April - Easter is always a special time, and yes plenty of Easter Eggs were consumed. The Family Day in April gave an opportunity for the children and YP to take part in puppet, craft and flag workshops.

May - The Youth Ministry Team met to plan and discuss all things children and young people.

June - Many of our children were part of the Pentecost Parade to Pencester. It was a wonderful afternoon of craft, celebration and good conversations

July - We had Movie July and enjoyed the wonderful DVD Lion of Judah, which follows the lives and experiences of a group of animals from Jesus' birth through to his crucifixion and resurrection. Of course popcorn was part of the sessions.

August - We hosted the CTID Holiday Club again. The in-house Gold Diggers Club looked at the story of Joseph. It was attended by around 45 children each day, with 80 or so parents and children coming to enjoy the party at the end of the club. Courteney left the team in August and we thank her for the invaluable help she has given to the Youth Ministry. We also congratulated her earlier in the year on her engagement.

September - Two children moved onto Secondary School and each were given a book which we hope will help them on their secondary school journey. We also started a series on Special Agents of God and this programme will continue well into 2020 and possibly beyond. ♦

October - Our Fairground Light Party was part of the wider Dover Programme. It was a wonderful event, greatly enjoyed with a deep sense of calm and peace, as the real alternative to Halloween. Each child received a Light Party Bag with lots of goodies, activities and SU booklet on Jesus' light. Around 80 parents and children attended.

November - Xtreme gave a valuable contribution to the SEBA Ladies Day - painting nails, leading worship and hand massage. All greatly appreciated by the delegates.

December - This brought the usual rehearsals for the Christmas Family Service as we presented the Nativity through our four Special OO Agents. Every child and young person had the gift of a book or Bible given to them after the service.

This year the key area of safeguarding has been reviewed, a new policy put in place and safeguarding training has been attended by all the team whether through SEBA or other agencies. Alison Coleman is now our Safeguarding Trustee with Janet Wheeler as our Designated Officer and Wendy Lane as deputy. We showed the recommended Baptist Union video at a Church Members meeting and in a Church Service. These outlined the importance we, as a church, place on safeguarding and it supported our Statement of Intent. A small team of us met to undertake an audit of the churches safeguarding processes, documentation and practice which highlighted areas which we could improve on. Actions are being worked through.

As we move into 2020 we will be reorganising the groups to reflect the needs of our children and young people. Alongside this we look forward to hosting the Ecumenical Holiday Club again and being part of the Dover-wide Light Party Programme and hopefully more besides.

Who knows what else God has for us 'at such a time as this'.

Safeguarding – Safe to Grow 2019

I took over the role of Safeguarding trustee at the AGM in April. The safeguarding team have met to discuss the policies for the church and the updated statement is now on display on the noticeboard.

Over the course of the year a total of 5 people have gone through the checking process. All people who are involved in children's work and/or working with possible vulnerable adults need to meet with our verifiers to submit personal details so that checks can be carried out as part of the Church's policy.

In addition, 15 people have completed the Level 2 Safeguarding training and 9 people have completed the Level 3 Safeguarding training.

We are thankful to Janet Wheeler and Wendy Lane for all the work they do as our Church Verifiers.

Dover Foodbank – 2019

Dover Foodbank Management Team would once again like to thank the members and friends of Dover Baptist Church for their continued support of local people in their times of need. Over 2019 the church donated 878kg of supplies to the work of the Dover Foodbank – sufficient for three days worth of food and other essentials for at least 103 people. However, we do know that this donation record only applies to items given via the foodbank's collection box at the church, and does not include donations given in other ways, eg. directly into collection points at local supermarkets. Irrespective of the donation route, all donations are much appreciated and make a real difference to the lives of local people in need.

During 2019 Dover Foodbank itself saw an increase in the amount of support it was called upon to provide – for the fourth year in a row, with a 12% increase over 2018. During the year the foodbank provided support of three days' worth of food etc for the equivalent of 3,399 people, with 36% of those supported being children – needing a total of 29.2 tonnes of supplies over the whole year. Once again December was the busiest month of the year – being our busiest month ever to date in terms of the amount of support given – and all the support that the foodbank is able to provide is thanks to the kindness and generosity of local people.

Dover Foodbank continues to operate the system whereby, in order to access the support it can give, people need to be referred by a trained professional in one of the over forty organisations with whom they work, the 3,399 people supported were included on the 1,601 referral vouchers redeemed during the year.

Dover Foodbank, part of CTiD and operating under the umbrella of Trussell Trust, is entirely volunteer-run and dependant on the support of local people. Several of the volunteers, including some members of the management team, are members of the fellowship here at DBC; we are each and all very thankful for the support which this church has given to the foodbank and its work and we ask the fellowship to continue to stand with us as we continue to show our Lord's love and care to those in the local community who are in need – *Thank you.*

Dover Street Pastors – 2019

This initiative is outside of our church but is still very well supported by the church. We have been on the streets now for over 8 years and are well into our ninth year. We cover a minimum of 3 Saturdays in 4 and 2 Fridays in 4 so, with the odd exceptions we have again fulfilled most our Friday & Saturday night commitments, this is a great achievement and testament to the support that the Street & Prayer pastors all give it.

The Street Pastors with the backing of the Prayer Pastors have noticed a significant difference to the atmosphere within the town centre on a Friday & Saturday night over the years. In the last 12 months we have seen a decline in homeless, which we can put down to the Outreach Centre getting to grips with what is needed for them. We are still there to help with the people out enjoying themselves, having conversations, providing lollipops and the occasional flip flop which has quite dramatically decreased in the past few years.

We still get asked "why we do it?", "How much do we get paid?", these are leading questions that gives us the opportunity to share our faith. Sometimes people just want someone to talk to, other times it is a shoulder to cry on. Whatever it is, all the time God wants us there we will be there to be used by God.

If you want to go out for one evening either as a Street Pastors or Prayer Pastor, you will be welcome as an observer, this will give you an insight into what we do, and perhaps you might just realise that God is telling you that he wants you to be involved, either by being a Street or Prayer pastor, and supporting it financially.

A review of the whole system was initiated with a view to a) undertaking work to renew the boilers, or go to an alternative system, in the summer of 2020 and b) moving away, as far as possible, from the need for boilers in the roof boiler house.
